Protection of Places - State and National Parks



This program allows students to understand the purpose of National Parks and view some of the significant natural and cultural features of Kamay Botany Bay National Park. They will have the opportunity to assess how the Park is managed to protect and interpret its plant and animal communities and cultural heritage.

Classes will engage in some of the following activities:


- Investigation of the bushland. The Banks/Solander Track and/or Burrawang Walk
- Exploration of the rocky shore (subject to suitable tides)
- Aboriginal uses of plants and materials. Bush tucker and Aboriginal artefacts
- Investigation of the unique local flora and fauna (native and feral animals)
- Complete a Field Journal
- Participate in a role play
